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Lynn Swanson, Music Director & Conductor



Lynn Swanson, Music Director & Conductor is a native of Atlanta. A life-long resident of the area, she has served the metro community as a leader in the musical arts for nearly 30 years. She holds the Bachelor of Music in Organ Performance from Shorter University in Rome, Georgia, and the Master of Music Education in Choral Pedagogy from the University of Kansas in Lawrence. She has studied conducting with Dr. William Baker, Dr. James Daugherty, and Alexander Mickelthwaite.

She has served as Music Director for several Greater Atlanta churches, building strong and diverse music programs in each. She was appointed Music Director & Organist for the St. Benedict's Episcopal Church in Smyrna, Georgia in August 2011. In less than six months she created a

children's music ministry in the young and rapidly growing congregation, and led an acclaimed performance of Handel's *Messiah* with the 70-voice choir and chamber orchestra before a standing-room-only audience from the parish and the wider community. In the four years of her tenure, the Choir of St. Benedict's has performed Antonio Vivaldi's *Gloria* and *Beatus Vir*, Franz Joseph Haydn's *The Creation*, Gabriel Faure's *Requiem*, and John Rutter's *Requiem*. The program is now a comprehensive music ministry with graded children's choral and handbell ensembles, in addition to a very active parish choir.

In addition to her service as Executive Associate Music Director of the William Baker Choral Foundation, Ms. Swanson is the Founder of the Northside Young Singers, the Summer Singers of Lee's Summit (cofounder) and the Cobb Summer Singers. In June 2015 she became Music Director of the organization's oldest Festival Singers ensemble. Now called the Lynn Swanson Festival Singers, the chorus was founded in 1985 as Gwinnett Festival Singers.



Recent choral/orchestral masterworks have included

Handel's Messiah; Mozart's Solemn Vespers; Faure's Requiem; Schubert's Mass in G; Haydn's Te Deum, Beethoven's Mass in C, Vivaldi's Beatus Vir, in addition to Bernstein: Chichester Psalms & Missa Brevis; Brahms: A German Requiem; Handel: Dettingen Te Deum & Water Music Suite, Mozart: Exsultate Jubilate, Eine kleine Nachtmusik and Coronation Mass; Bach: Brandenburg Concerto No. 2 in F, Cantata No. 51 "Jauchzet Gott in allen Landen," and Magnificat. Her choral ensembles have been featured recently as headline performers at the Christmas Atlanta Festival, Arts International, and appear annually at the Piccolo Spoleto Festival in Charleston, South Carolina.

Upcoming engagements with Lynn Swanson on the podium include a return performance for the Atlanta-based Festival Singers to Charleston's Piccolo Spoleto Festival, and an Atlanta performance in April 2016 of the *Mass in B minor* of Bach with the Lynn Swanson Festival Singers and the Orchestra of the American Heartland.

SARAH TANNEHILL ANDERSON, Soprano Soloist



Coloratura Soprano Sarah Tannehill Anderson is a vibrant singer with versatility and a flare for both comedy and drama on the operatic stage. She has performed leading operatic roles with the Boston Lyric Opera, Opera Company of Philadelphia, Opera Omaha, Fort Worth Opera, Opera Theatre of St. Louis, and the Saarländisches Staatstheatre in Saarbrücken, Germany. Shortly after Sarah's move to Kansas City in 2006, she received rave reviews for singing her first Ophelia in Thomas' Hamlet with the Kansas City Lyric Opera. In 2007, Sarah earned distinction from Symphony magazine as an Emerging Artist. She has sung with Chicago Chamber Orchestra, Chicago Symphony Orchestra, North Shore Choral Society, Southern Illinois Symphony, Wichita Symphony, Sheboygan Symphony Orchestra, the KC Chamber Orchestra, the New Ear Ensemble, and the Kansas City Symphony. Sarah is also a three-time Emmy winner for her film work with the Missouri Department of Conservation. Sarah received her Master's Degree at UMKC Conservatory in 1999. She is a member of the Lyric Arts Trio, and teaches voice in Overland Park, Lee's Summit and William Jewell College. A favorite of Choral Foundation audiences, she has appeared in numerous performances with the Summer Singers of Kansas City and the William Baker Festival Singers.

DAVID WHITE, Tenor Soloist

David White, Tenor, is a native of Massillon, Ohio. He holds the Bachelor of Arts from Kent State University, where he studied voice with Margaret Palmieri. In Kansas City he was student of the late Thilda Beuing, and presently studies with Arnold Epley. He has been featured by numerous symphony orchestras in oratorio roles in Ohio and Missouri. His passion, however, is the performance and interpretation of art song and German lieder, especially the works of Brahms, Beethoven, Wolf, Vaughan Williams, Gurney, and Britten. He has frequently collaborated with John Schaefer, Canon Musician of the Grace and Holy Trinity Cathedral. He is a former member of the Trinity Choir. He has appeared in Haydn: *The Creation* and Helvering: *Te Deum* with Dr. William Baker and the Choir of the Faith Lutheran Church in Prairie Village, Kansas.

JOSHUA LAWLOR, Baritone Soloist

Musicianship and an instinctive musicality have established a particularly frequent place for Kansas City-native Joshua Lawlor on the oratorio and recital stages. He has sung with many of the city's most respected concert organizations, and consistently delivers stirring solo performances as our flourishing arts community explores fresh repertoire, both ancient and modern. Some of his favorite performances with William Baker choirs include Brahms' German Requiem, Mendelssohn's Elijah, and Ernst Bloch's stirring setting of the Jewish service Avodath Hakodesh. Strong musical skill has also allowed for the breadth of modern music in Mr. Lawlor's repertoire. He has premiered roles in new works including six operas and a number of song-cycles. His young studio of voice students continues to gain attention for fine singing and strong preparation; those wishing to pursue a career in music have gained entrance to some of the country's most prestigious conservatories.

STEVEN McDONALD, Organist & Accompanist



Steven McDonald joined the staff of the Choral Foundation with the creation of the Summer Singers of Lee's Summit in 2014. Dr. McDonald holds degrees in organ and conducting from the Boston University School for the Arts, the Sweelinck Conservatorium in Amsterdam, and the Doctor of Musical Arts from University of Kansas in Lawrence. He is presently Assistant Professor of Music at Ottawa University in Ottawa, Kansas, and serves as Music Director & Conductor of the Ottawa University Orchestra. He is the former conductor of the Lawrence Chamber Orchestra. Previous positions have included Music Director for the University of Kansas Camerata, the University of Kansas Opera, The Westford Chorus (Massachusetts), the MIT Chamber Orchestra (Massachusetts), and Musica Modus Vivendi at Harvard University in Cambridge, Massachusetts. Church positions have included Church of the Good Shepherd in Reading, Massachusetts, St. Luke's Church in Amsterdam, St. Joseph Church in Wakefield,

Massachusetts, St.. Michael's Church in Marblehead, Massachusetts, Colonial Church in Kansas City, and Cherokee Christian Church and Faith Lutheran Church, both in Prairie Village. Dr. McDonald presently serves as Organist for the Rolling Hills Presbyterian Church in Overland Park. He makes his home in Lawrence, Kansas.

The Summer Singers of Lee's Summit



The Summer Singers of Lee's Summit was created in June 2014 as the newest ensemble of the Roeland park-based William Baker Choral Foundation. Their 2014 performance of Mozart's *Missa Brevis in D* was heard by a capacity audience and hailed as "...a significant contribution to Kansas City's growing family of choirs." Today's concert marks their second annual performance.

The Summer Singers of Lee's Summit continues the tradition that was called "the very best of amateur music-making..." by Pierre Ruhe of *The Atlanta Constitution*. Beginning with the original Summer Singers of Atlanta in 1990, the Choral Foundation has created five summer choruses that now involve over 450 participants from six states.

No audition is required for membership in the Summer Singers. All adults and mature youth from the age of 16 are invited to participate. Weekly rehearsals begin each June and culminate in performances with distinguished soloists and professional orchestras at the end of the summer. Past performances by Summer Singers choruses have included Beethoven: Symphony No. 9, Choral Fantasy & Mass in C, Mendelsohn's Elijah, Haydn's The Creation and Lord Nelson Mass, the Requiems of Brahms, Mozart, Durufle and Rutter, among many, many other masterworks. The 2016 3rd Summer Singers of Lee's Summit and Chamber Orchestra will perform The Creation of Franz Joseph Haydn in a delightful English translation by Robert Shaw. Registration opens March 1, 2016. The Choral Foundation

The William Baker Choral Foundation, headquartered in Roeland Park, Kansas, supports choral ensembles based in Georgia, Kansas and Missouri. These include The William Baker Festival Singers and The Lynn Swanson Festival Singers, semi-professional ensembles that have distinguished themselves in concerts, recordings, broadcasts and tours across the South, Midwest and Northeast. The newest ensemble ventures of the organization are the Summer Singers of Lee's Summit in the Missouri suburbs of Kansas City, and Zimria Festivale Atlanta, a chamber chorus celebrating the music of the Jewish heritage and works of Jewish composers, based in suburban Atlanta.

The Choral Foundation's continuing education program includes opportunities for Student Interns at the Master's level and Choral Scholars at the doctoral level. Thirty alumni of the program now serve in significant church, school and professional choral leadership positions across the nation. The Choral Foundation is the sponsor for Amber Waves Music Publishing, (www.AmberWavesPublishing.com) a creative house with over 50 titles by up and coming composers and arrangers.

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Dr. William O. Baker, Founder of the Choral Foundation

William O. Baker has earned a reputation as an entrepreneurial conductor and creator of choral organizations. He founded the DeKalb Choral Guild in 1978 at the age of 19. By the age of 21 he had conducted Brahms' *German Requiem*, Vivaldi's *Gloria*, Schubert's *Mass in G*, and Handel's *Messiah* with professional orchestras, launching a career of ambitious artistic leadership that now has extended nearly forty years. In the last few years he has conducted the *St. Matthew Passion* and the *Mass in B minor* of Bach, and the *Sacred Service* of Ernest Bloch, at the time of the performances the only Kansas City-based conductor to lead the works in over a quarter-century.

Baker created the Atlanta-based William Baker Festival Singers, originally called "Gwinnett" Festival Singers, in 1985, and established the William Baker Choral Foundation in 1990. In 1998 the conductor moved his home to the Kansas City area and created the Kansas City ensemble of the Festival Singers. The Choral Foundation has created over a dozen ensembles based in three states, involving hundreds of singers in the course of any year. His choirs have performed for numerous conventions of the American Choral Directors Association, the National Association for Music Education, and the American Guild of Organists, in addition to the 1982 World's Fair and music festivals in the United States and Great Britain, most notably annual appearances before capacity audiences at Charleston's Piccolo Spoleto Festival since 1989. He has led the Festival Singers in the production of 23 nationally released recordings, and in television and radio appearances across the nation, including *The First Art*, *The Sounds of Majesty* and National Public Radio's *Performance Today*.

No stranger to the orchestral podium, William Baker created the Mountain Park Wind Symphony in 1994 and the Kansas City Wind Symphony in 1998. Recent orchestral performances have included Vivaldi: *The Seasons*, Sibelius: *Finlandia*, Bach: *Brandenburg Concerto No. 2*, Bizet: *Suite L'Arlesienne*, Haydn: *Symphony No. 59 "Fire*," Mozart: *Symphony No. 41*, Beethoven: *Symphony No. 7* and *Symphony No. 9*. Choral collaborations have included projects with members of the Kansas City Symphony, the Kazanetti Chamber Orchestra, the Atlanta Youth Symphony Orchestra, the Kansas City Civic Orchestra, the Baton Rouge Symphony, the Gwinnett Symphony Orchestra, and the Charleston Symphony Orchestra. He is Founder & Music Director of the Atlanta-based Orchestra of the American Heartland.

Dr. Baker served as Minister of Music for a number of significant Lutheran, Presbyterian and United Methodist congregations across the South and the Midwest. Major appointments have included the historic Grace United Methodist Church in Midtown Atlanta and The Village Church in suburban Kansas City, the nation's second largest Presbyterian congregation. Presently, he serves as director of The Cathedral Chorale, the choir for Grace and Holy Trinity Cathedral in Kansas City's 8:00 AM Eucharist. He is the author of Hearts & Hands & Voices: Weekly Reflections on Music and the Church, published by Amber Waves Music.

An Atlanta native, Dr. Baker studied voice and choral conducting at Mercer University and the University of Georgia before culminating his formal education at the American Conservatory of Music in Chicago where he earned the Doctor of Musical Arts in Choral Conducting. The Baker family makes their home in northeastern Kansas. Dr. Baker commutes weekly to serve conducting responsibilities in Georgia, Kansas and Missouri. His accomplishments have been recognized in his native state through proclamations by two Georgia Governors, Joe Frank Harris and Sonny Purdue, by United States Congressman Phil Gingrey, and by a 2015 proclamation by the State of Georgia House of Representatives. In 2012 he was honored for his lifetime contributions to the cultural life of his hometown by the Pro-Mozart Society of Atlanta. In 2015 he was named Conductor Emeritus of The DeKalb Choral Guild.
